

**1 ICW Track**

Get an overview of the ICW's route as it winds along rivers, runs behind barrier islands, and crosses open sounds.

**2 Transit Counties**

Severe weather warning for Hyde County? Check the counties along the ICW route and know when a weather warning applies to you.

**3 Inland Counties**

Look to the ghosted county names to locate inland counties mentioned in approaching weather forecasts.

**4 Cities and Mileages**

Use the distance table for quick estimates of travel time between cities and towns.

**5 Seasonal Temperatures**

Note the average high temperature for daytime exposure, or average seasonal low temperature for evenings at anchor. Also in Celsius for metric-minded cruisers.

**6 Sounds, Bays, and Capes**

A lighthouse icon marks the major capes mentioned in NOAA broadcasts. Major sounds and bays are also labeled.

**7 NOAA Weather Towers**

Locate the closest WX weather tower for the appropriate weather broadcast.

**8 Latitude and Longitude**

Latitude and longitude tics provide a sense of your north or south (and east or west) progression.

**9 Required Charts**

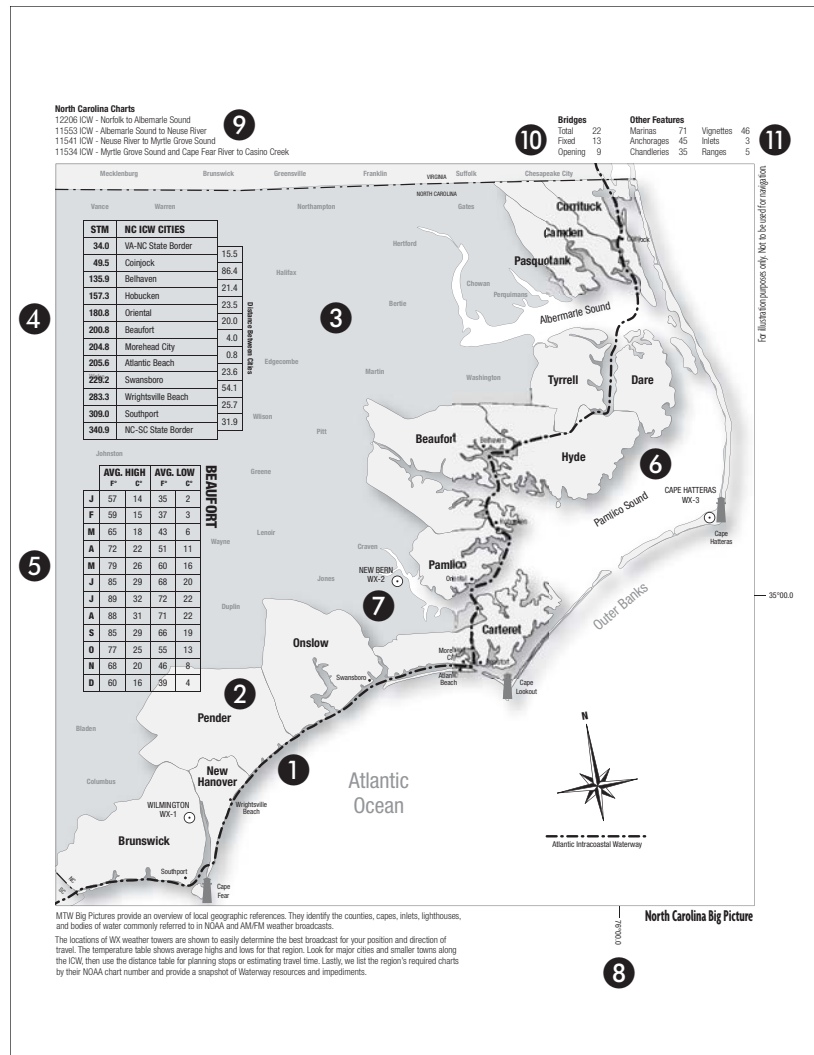
A list of required NOAA charts.

**10 Bridge Summary**

Get a "feel" for the state's bridge situation and make plans accordingly. Each summary is broken out by fixed and opening bridges.

**11 Additional Features Summary**

An overview of what's ahead for that state. The number of marinas, anchorages, chandleries, vignettes, inlets, and ranges is given.



**STATE BIG PICTURES**

Each state begins with a boater-centric visual overview of the geography, called a BIG PICTURE™. Use BIG PICTURES in lieu of a road atlas to locate counties, cities, sounds, and capes commonly referred to in local NOAA or AM/FM weather broadcasts. Specifically geared to ICW cruisers, these overview maps include the ICW route, weather tower locations, and summaries of that state's Waterway attributes.

The BIG PICTURE for each state includes tables for ICW city distances and average seasonal temperatures. Look to the upper left for a list of required NOAA charts. In the upper right, each state's features, including bridges, marinas, anchorages, chandleries, inlets, and ranges, give an overview of what's coming.
